The Group was renamed the East London History Society in 1969. The fact that in its earliest incarnation there was a distinct Stepney Unit suggests that the Group may have had a federal structure and been made up of other similar units for Poplar and Bethnal Green, and also Hackney and Newham - the other east London boroughs which the Society was interested in.</p> <p>Most records of the Society are uncatalogued.
